# PLANNING A FUNERAL

During this time of grief, count on the **PRAYERS & SYMPATHY** of the parish community of St. Peter Cathedral. We stand with you in your mourning, raising you up in prayer, that God's mercy will give strength and consolation.

Planning a Catholic Funeral may seem complicated and intimidating. The parish staff will gladly help you! Typically, after meeting with the funeral director to make funeral arrangements, a family may want to meet with the priest to plan the liturgies: usually a wake service at the funeral home and the funeral Mass in church. Sometimes, they would rather not meet.

The **WAKE SERVICE**, if one is desired, could either be 1) a communal recitation of the rosary or 2) a scripture service with (or without) remembrances (eulogy). The family chooses, considering the life and devotion of the deceased and the number of non-Catholics who may be present. It is also acceptable to forego the wake service altogether.

The survivors decide how much of the **FUNERAL MASS** they would like to plan. **A Catholic person has a right to a Funeral Mass**, so choosing some other option must be made with respect to that right.

**READINGS** may be chosen according to the schema at right. Options are listed on the reverse side of this sheet. These readings need not necessarily "fit" the life or personality of the deceased. They may be chosen more for the consolation of those who will gather for the funeral. Readings from scripture not found on this sheet <u>may</u> be used as long as they are taken from the same section of the bible (Old Testament, New Testament, Gospel). Non-scriptural readings or poetry are not permitted during the time of the Mass readings. Psalms are used for the Responsorial Psalm and not as one of the readings. A specific responsorial psalm may be requested from the musicians.

Our music director, Mr. Richard Thompson, will be happy to help you choose the **MUSIC** and make arrangements for a cantor. During the service in church, only **SACRED MUSIC** (music found in our hymnal, for example) is permitted. Secular music can be played at the funeral home, but not in church.

**GIFT BEARERS, READERS,** and **SERVERS** may also be chosen. Readers must be Catholic accustomed to reading the scriptures at Mass. A server is provided by the parish, unless a family desires someone specific to serve.

The proper place for a **EULOGY** or **REMEMBRANCE** is at the Vigil Service. Under certain circumstances, a brief 2- to 3-minute eulogy may be permitted at the end of the funeral Mass. Longer eulogies tend to make everyone uncomfortable.

Most often, a funeral Mass takes place at **10:00AM** at St. Peter Cathedral. Other times are perfectly acceptable, bearing in mind that the scheduling of the church for many other events has to be considered.

Please keep in mind that, out of respect for the deceased, THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH REQUIRES THE BURIAL OR ENTOMBMENT OF THE MORTAL REMAINS OF THE DECEASED, even if cremated.

As a sign of affection for your family and friends, we offer a simple but delicious **FUNERAL LUNCHEON** after the burial. Please notify us of the planned number of people attending if you want this service.

Again, you're remembered daily in the prayers of the parishioners of St. Peter Cathedral. May those prayers and God's eternal mercy upon all His people bring you comfort and peace!
